February's presentation is "The Science and Technology of the James Webb Space Telescope", by Dr. Till Liepmann, a senior systems engineer working on the JWST optical telescope. He received a BS from Caltech in 1979 and a PhD in Optical Sciences from the University of Arizona in 1983. He has been continuously active in optics and science for over 26 years. Currently, Dr. Liepmann is one of a team responsible for verifying that the telescope will provide the performance needed to achieve the science mission.

Telescope to Mexico

During IYA2009, the AU decided to reach out to another country and respond to a request from the blossoming "Cosmonavis" Astronomy Club in Merida, Yucatan, by donating a telescope to the Arcadio Poveda Planetarium. For the past several months we've been searching for the scope that their Club felt would serve them best, and could be packaged up and shipped safely. Under the guiding hand of Equipment Coordinator Art Harris, the AU purchased a pre-owned Celestron Ultima 8 Schmidt-Cassegrain telescope for \$600. The package includes an 8X50 optical finder with a 90 degree diagonal, a Telrad finder, heavy duty tripod and wedge, a Celestron scope carrying case, a second case containing several evepieces, battery connectors, power cabling, 90 degree diagonal for the OTA, and Astro Master electronic digital setting circles. Some club members also generously donated additional eyepieces. I'm sure Cosmonavis Club President Fernando Avil Zapata, and the rest of the members, will enjoy and learn much from the AU's donation. Congratulations to them and a wish of clear skies!

International Astronomy Day 04/24/10
