This Month's Meeting

Our October meeting will feature a talk by Lee Coombs entitled "Color Astrophotography for the Amateur." With the advent of greatly improved color films in recent years, photographing celestial events and objects has become a popular pastime for an increasing number of people. No longer is it necessary to use exotic processing techniques or elaborate and expensive equipment to achieve excellent results. Now, a roll of film may often have family or vacation photos mixed with some astronomical photos ready to be processed by a local photo dealer.

This presentation will describe equipment, film, and techniques used to photograph a wide range of astronomical subjects and events. Techniques will range from the use of tripod-mounted cameras to direct photography through a telescope. The results of such methods will be illustrated with actual photographs taken by the speaker using common offthe-shelf color films and without using any specialized processing or pre-treatment techniques. Some interesting projects will also be described in the hope of encouraging those that haven't to give astrophotography a try.

Lee Coombs recently retired after 32 years of teaching at Cal Poly State University in San Luis Obispo. He received his Ph.D. in analytical chemistry from Purdue University in 1970 and has

been a Professor of Chemistry at Cal Poly since that time. He began doing astrophotography in earnest around 1972 and had his first photos published in Astronomy Magazine in 1974. Since then, he has had his work published in numerous magazines and in over 30 books.

In 1979, he co-founded the Central Coast Astronomical Society and was elected its first president. This amateur group has grown rapidly in membership and remains a very active organization. Lee enjoys fishing and travel with his wife Penny and sharing his love of astronomy with others.

Annual AU Campout

The AU campout is all set for the weekend of October 19/20/21 at the Lopez Lake Recreation Area. We will be in the Live Oak Group Area, near Mallard Cove at lake level, which has a large barbecue, water, electricity, nearby restroom with hot showers, full shade, and good views. Daytime activities include boating, canoeing, fishing, hiking, wind boarding, bicycling, and bird watching.

Lopez Lake is just ten miles east of Arroyo Grande off Highway 101. Within easy driving range are wineries, golf courses, shopping, historic sites, and Hearst Castle.

The Marina Store has groceries, fishing tackle, tee shirts, souvenirs, and a laundromat. Motorboats, paddle boats, kayaks, and hydro-bikes are available for rental.

It doesn't matter how many campers or day visitors we have at the site, but automobile access is limited. Our first six vehicles are covered by the reservation fee. An additional two vehicles may park at the group site for a \$12 per vehicle per night fee. Additional vehicles will pay the same fee, but must park in the overflow lot. The AU will cover the parking fees. Pets are an additional \$2 per day. Nonmotorized watercraft are \$2.50 per day, and motorized craft are \$5 per day, if you bring your own.

We'll have our usual potluck dinner on Saturday evening, and observing on Friday and Saturday nights. The Moon will be 3-4 days old, so we'll have plenty of dark sky to wander through, and the Orionid meteors may give us a little show.
